Ingleborough Archaeology Group

In addition to the huge quantity of University approved knowledge amassed by the group, recent results have been very exciting. 'We are daily watching the trench made by the electricity supply going underground in the Twistleton Lane area, for early evidence. We have already found a fire site (possibly Mesolithic?) and there are weeks to go! Noel Crack and Arthur Batty have found a sword blade in Kingsdale. Charcoal dating from the site gives us 760 AD and 900 AD-so Anglo-Saxon (or Viking?) More timbers have emerged

from the riverbank at

Sandymire which may be part of a prehistoric track or causeway.'

Natural History

Notes from a Wildlife garden and the Wider Parish:
Have you seen many butterflies in your garden this summer? The white ones seem to cope with the rain but apart from welcome painted ladies, it has been a red-letter day when we have spotted a Small Tortoiseshell, once the commonest butterfly. This species is now the target of a

parasite which consumes the caterpillar. Red Admirals and Peacocks have enjoyed the Buddleia but not in their usual numbers and a few Meadow Browns have drifted in from the neighbouring fields. Three Years' wet summers have contributed towards a dramatic reduction in our butterfly numbers and varieties nationwide. An encouraging sign: we now see Speckled Wood butterflies in places with semi shade - recently spread into our parish.

Previously we have had the occasional nuthatch on the feeders but this year we have had a whole family and seen others quite frequently. We are thrilled that we now have enough mature trees in the garden and nearby hedgerows to attract this handsome bird which has spread into Northern England during that past 20 years.

As Swallows and House Martins gather to leave us in September, we look forward to the fruits and colourful fungi of autumn and the noisy visiting fieldfares and Redwings which spend the winter with us to escape the harsh weather in their native countries.

Oct 27th W.I. Lunch. - venue tba. Three times a year the group lunches together, sampling the menus at local eating places, combined once a year with the Day Out!



In Your Garden: Though the summer weather has been variable, it has been reasonable compared to the last two years!: the Busy Lizzies stood a better chance, the geraniums were lovely and the tomatoes are hanging like grapes, though strangely there seems to be fewer mushrooms than usual. To do in September: plant your bulbs for Christmas and Spring and do your winter baskets – possibly an 'Irish Dawn' Hebe, tinged with red, in the centre to plant out next year. In October trim down, though not too hard - leave some pruning 'til spring. You can be too tidy! Then in November it's time too ease off and watch out for holly for your wreathes ('Mayqueen' is special) and gather moss now to dry for your winter creations. Contact: Alan Collier 41868


#### St Oswald's historic church tower



The tower is all that remains of the ancient Norman church dating back to the 13<sup>th</sup> century. During a blizzard in 1933 a fire gutted the church which was rebuilt as a replica of the 1870 building, in a decorative 14<sup>th</sup> century gothic style by Austin and Paley. Standing near the foot of Ingleborough, It is widely regarded as one of the most beautiful churches in the diocese.

Sir Arthur Conan Doyle was married here and there is a compelling argument that Emily Bronte's' *Wuthering Heights*' was set in this vicinity.
