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### Cave Rescue (CRO)

The Kingsdale Master Streamway has been the scene of a many a dramatic life-saving call-out by Clapham Cave Rescue. Chairman Jack Pickup of Thornton says the annual call-out rate is rapidly rising - more than 40 this year so far- most recently two cavers lost overnight in Swinsto Hole above dangerous floodwaters which took altogether 386 group manhours to bring to the surface; and a caver too exhausted to ladder climb to the roof Tunnel, hauled out and escorted to safety.

Jack is very grateful for generous donations towards the great £150,000 new extension to the Depo: eg, a young enthusiast's Bay Walk Team's £11000 and a percentage of Dent Breweries' limited edition 'Resc-ewe' Beer!

Celebrating its 75th Anniversary later this year with a grand dinner for rescued and rescuers, it was the first volunteer rescue team in the country, possibly the world - operational since 1935 when senior clubs set it up along with the Police and St John's Ambulance after a very protracted rescue of an injured caver.

The team is voluntary, made up of local experienced cavers, climbers and walkers who give their time freely to help those in need of assistance on the fells and down the caves, funded entirely by charitable donations and on call at all times, day or night. This year the Queen recognized the team's exceptional public service with the prestigious award of the M.B.E.

### In the Garden

I'm afraid gardens have suffered from late planting after the cold frosty spring and now the lack of sun this strange 'summer.' Beans and potatoes may be needing some fungicide this wet weather. (But in the greenhouse a pot of peas has given me a huge crop!) We have had also a lot of trouble with weeds which love the wet-hoeing is best in dry weather but can still save your back if it's damp!

Looking ahead – get on with sowing Pansies and Polyanthus now in September and they will be strong when you need them-or if you leave it, buy plugs. Separate your strawberries and replant the bed (basket or pot) Also bulbs, of course, for the house at Christmas and the garden early spring. There will be more flushes of mushrooms -very good this year-and the blackberries will be marvelous as are the apples.

Storage – apples, beetroot etc: keep cool and separate. Check regularly as you use them-least perfect first.

I counted 24 brilliantly coloured butterflies on my Buddleia one sunny moment – a must for every garden along with Cotoneaster for the birds and nettles for nature. Soak some in water and give it your plants – unbeatable!

### **Our Natural History**

Blue, Great and Coal Tits have been numerous this summer having bred well in spring; Redpolls have visited the table regularly for the nyger seeds and Nuthatches for the black sunflower. Our Swallows chose a new site for nesting this year. The Blackbirds are now on their third brood, the rain making worms available for them and snails for the Thrushes! A resident has reported chaffinches feeding on Amelanchier berries in her garden.

In Edith's Wood, Meadow Brown Butterflies and Skippers are flying on sunny days. This Woodland Trust area is turning into an excellent nature reserve. We have seen few Small Tortoiseshells, Painted Ladies and Red Admirals in the garden but hope that August and September will bring more of these beauties as some may migrate from the continent where they have bred more successfully.

Yellow Underwing Moths emerge abundantly now from grassy places leaving their maroon pupae in the soil. In our (humane) moth trap we have had the Poplar Hawk and the Elephant Hawk moths – both very impressive – and the small, white, dotted Bird Cherry Ermine whose caterpillars, as seen on television, weave protective webs in trees (also in Edith's Wood.)

At the pond, Broad-bodied Chaser dragonflies have laid eggs, and several Blue Damselflies – one identifiable as the rarer Azure. August will have brought our usual Common Darters and the great Southern Hawker Dragonfly, given some good weather!

### Ingleborough Archaeology Group

The dig at Kingdale Head in May/June yielded an extra 800 "small finds," most worked pieces of chert (available locally) with a much smaller number of worked flint pieces (the flint got from trading or possibly odd pieces washed up on the coast.) They show us that the people at Kingsdale Head 8500 years ago were making a variety of stone tools to help them acquire food, shelter, clothing and defences against predators. Their ingenuity in using local resources to create sharpedged stone tools is astonishing.

During the year a significant number of sites have been identified from the "Dark Ages" (between the Romans leaving Britain in the 5th century and the establishment of the great Anglo-Saxon kingdoms in the 9<sup>th</sup>.) Previously nothing was recorded from this period locally but we now know that farmers, woodworkers and smiths were at Chapel-le-Dale and Clapham who were affluent enough to own a high status sword. <u>Pre-Roman sites</u> have been noted by members on Leck Fell, Twistleton Scar End and Scales Moor. The latter two locations will be subject to extensive mapping over the next couple of years. <u>The Traditional Farm Buildings census and survey</u> in the parish is almost complete following the work done in the early summer.

### **Old Houses of Thornton** Thornton Hall (1.)

Although, judging by the archaeological dig at Broadwood, Thornton may have existed in Romano-British times, most of our old houses only date back to the Elizabethan period.

One of the most interesting was Thornton Hall, now alas no more. Our 'best window' on the hall was when it was used by Sir John Redmayne in the seventeenth century. There with Lady Sarah his wife and his children he presided as Lord of the Manor of Thornton. Thornton was an ancient manor, part of the 'honour' of Richmond, so when the Duke of Richmond became Henry VII in 1485, Thornton became a Royal manor in the hands of the king. (Therefore later, the Redmaynes were bound to fight for Charles 1 in the civil war in which Sir John was killed.)

So Thornton manor had probably been half timbered, its position on the Dent road chosen for its defensive position commanding the valley. As an ancient hall, the family and retainers would all live in the great central space, with a platform at one end as the apartment for the Lord and his family. The communal fire for heating and cooking would be in the centre of the hall floor, with a hole in the roof for the smoke. Its tower would provide a defensive look out. (Continued)
