Secondly, that the hamlets of Gale Green, Masongill, Thornton, High Westhouse, Far Westhouse and Low Westhouse added together, make up the civil parish of Thornton in Lonsdale. The commemorative plaque is there as a permanent reminder to all 123 households in our parish that 2012 was a vear of celebration and achievement. We extend our thanks to the original Diamond Jubilee Committee out of which came so many creative ideas and to the Parish Council for designing, planning and authorising the finished product. The excellent plague was created by Chris Duckett and the stone plinth beautifully constructed by Gordon Guy.

Christmas Festivities

As Christmas approaches we all tend to get swept along in the busy build up. It is also a busy time in the Parish with lots of gatherings and get togethers arranged. We hope you are able to join us at one or more of the events. The event are listed throughout the Newsletter.

WILDLIFE NOTES

The lovely autumn colours this year were due to the wet summer. It's the only bonus I can think of! We at least had Small Tortoiseshell, Red Admiral and Peacock Butterflies in the garden from late summer till the third week of September, but after that they gave in to the continual unsettled weather. No Painted Ladies or Commas this year. We had the usual Chiffchaff stop over for a week in September on its way south on migration and a family of Pied Wagtails stopped off for a few days which gave us a treat but otherwise bird sightings are down. The winter visitors from Northern Europe are here again and we have seen flocks of Fieldfares and Redwings passing over. We are recording sightings monthly during the winter for the British Trust for Ornithology. They are undertaking a study of the feeding habits of members of the Thrush family during the winter months. Look out for them feeding on berried trees and shrubs. Also look out especially for the exotic-looking Waxwings that have arrived in large numbers this year as the berry harvest in Scandinavia has been very poor. They are Starling-sized with a chestnut crest,

black throat, yellow tail band and red waxy wing tips. Also Bramblings may be seen feeding on the ground with flocks of visiting Chaffinches at bird feeders. While the male Chaffinches have pink breasts, Bramblings have orange breasts and brown heads. They have been seen already and we had some in the garden last year.

The Ash die-back disease is bad news, particularly for our area, as Ash is probably our commonest local tree. First seen in Poland in 1992 the disease has spread throughout Europe. The airborne spores of this fungus can travel long distances and it is inevitable that some of our trees will be affected in the next few vears. Look around you and you will see how Ash is such an important part of our local landscape. It is hard to imagine our hedgerows, farmland and woodlands without these iconic trees. Symptoms are blackened leaves, dark diamond-shaped lesions on the trunk and in mature trees die-back of twigs and branches in the crown. Further details and action on finding infected trees are to be found on the Woodland Trust website. On a more optimistic note spring bulbs are beginning to move so look out for welcome snowdrops in the verges by the New Year and Hazel catkins nodding cheerfully nearby. Later listen for the harsh calls of Rooks busy about their rookeries, being some of the earliest nesting birds. By early February other birds including Song Thrushes will be returning to our gardens and hedgerows. Don't forget to let us have your wildlife records.

A significant Victorian bench mark

Next time you come to church, as you approach the porch, glance left at the south west buttress of the tower. There you will see what has been described by a specialist as 'probably the most impressive bench mark I've seen.'

When Napoleon was threatening to invade and conquer England, the War Office decided on a survey of the south coast so as to make available to those who controlled the ordinance (guns) accurate maps on how to plan the defence of the realm – hence our 'ordinance survey' maps.

Later this was extended to the whole country and between 1840 and 1860 the 'First Primary Levelling' was carried out using Liverpool as a datum (the mean of the high and low water marks taken over ten days in 1844.)

The Thornton bench mark was levelled with a height of 441.8760 feet [134.6838 metres] above the Liverpool datum. The cut mark or bolt consists of a horizontal line with an arrow head below. The initials VR on either side of the mark are presumably in homage to Queen Victoria. Sometimes visitors, on seeing this strange device cut into our tower, think it is a mason's mark. But its significance is greater, it forms a basic triangulation point on which all our modern maps have been based.

First Primary Levelling, England & Wales (1840-60)

This bench mark was used during the First primary levelling, England & Wales, and was levelled with a height of 441.8760 feet [134.6838 metres] above mean sea level (Liverpool datum). It was included as a side level on the

<u>Milner's Bridge to Bradford</u> levelling line. The surveyor's description was *No. 31(a)*. *St. Oswalds's Church, Thornton. Bolt in tower*; *4.40 ft. above surface (p448).*

Logged Visits

Visited on 29th July 2009 by <u>Ramblinjohn</u>. Grid reference: <u>SD 6855 7360</u>. Condition: Good.

Probably the most impressive bench mark I've seen, this cut mark is high up (1.4m) on the south west facing buttress on the tower of St Oswald's. The initials VR are on either side of the mark, presumably in homage to Queen Victoria. This is mark 31(a) on a Branch level off the Milner's Bridge to Bradford line. Surprisingly it is only referred to as a cut mark on the modern O.S. database but the levelled heights are within 1.3 inches, so it must be the same mark.
